Hikers Help Hospice

People who pledged to Hike for Hospice can rest assured the money was well earned.

Thirty walkers of all ages braved deplorable cold, windy, wet weather to take part in the hospice fundraiser by trekking three kilometers along the Trans Canada Trail in St. Thomas. "We were just tickled pink, look at the day!" said an enthused Mary Lou Stanley, treasurer for Serenity House Hospice Inc.
